Bierhaus, downtown's popular pub and beer garden, 383 Castro at California, invites neighborhood residents for light refreshments **Sunday afternoon October 12, 4-6 PM.** No RSVP

needed; just show up!

Opened three years ago (as SteakOut), Bierhaus has evolved in format and menu. Grass-fed hamburgers and hot sandwiches (two of them vegetarian) remain house specialties; other menu offerings came and went; the beer range is now considerable and international (whence the name change to Bierhaus, last November). If you last tried this restaurant more than a few months back, the changes may surprise

By mid-2013, along with the newly opened Steins and venerable Tied House, Bierhaus had helped establish downtown Mountain View as a new "destination" beer-garden scene, and the restaurant's popularity soared. Many restaurateurs would be content with that, but in 2014, Bierhaus's owners went further, hiring a specialized chef to add a Germanic pub food menu. These new specialties compare well to similar dishes I've had in Europe. They include house-made sausages (three kinds now), condiments, and casual foods including a remarkable Spätzle platter (menus at http://www.bierha.us/eat cover basics, but don't include every latest addition).

Bierhaus, near Old Mountain View's geographical center, is a walkable destination for many OMV residents. Just as well: the unusual pub foods and beer offerings may give you reason to work off a calorie or two.

Keeping Mountain View Safe



Holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

HOLIDAY DECORATING

Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that

Fire Safety in Holiday Time

are flame resistant or flame retardant.

- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections.
- Connect no more than three strands of mini light sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screwin bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

School Zone Traffic Tips

slow down in school zones. The speed limit in all school zones in Mountain View is 25 mph. One of the most important and primary reasons 25 mph was chosen is perception and reaction time.

A common scenario is someone suddenly entering a crosswalk or running across a street and being struck by a vehicle. The driver often tells us by the time they saw the person, they already hit them. This is because it takes approximately 1.5 seconds from the point by Sgt. Saul Jaeger at which you see the child run into the roadway until your foot hits the brake pedal (.75 seconds to perceive the danger and .75 seconds to react to it) especially when you are not expecting it. Keep in mind that this is how long it will take you to START TO STOP...and that all depends on your initial speed. Without getting into algorithms and roadway friction discussions, the priority in school zones is the safety of the children so please... slow down.




